Memorial Garden

The square garden bed next to the Old Sunday School entrance has been prepared as a memorial garden for children who died while they were in the Orphan Schools, many of whom were then buried in St John's Burial Ground—often in unmarked graves. (Before December 1835, children from the Orphan Schools were buried either at Trinity Burial Ground, Campbell Street, or the Catholic Burial Ground above St Mary's Cathedral.) The garden has been planted with a box hedge and carpet roses. They have been carefully nurtured since planting and are showing good signs of growth.

This project has been led by Joyce Purtscher. During the summer break, she and her husband Joe have worked on all the gardens that surround the Old Sunday School. They have dug up countless belladonna lilies, taken away many bags of twitch, spread mushroom compost and planted the gardens. Earlier in 2011 Simon Cocker and his son James had done significant heavy work clearing the gardens of existing shrubbery. On that occasion rubbish was removed by Andrea Gerrard and her husband.

Joyce, together with Rosie Davidson, is now compiling a list of all the children known to have died while at the Orphan Schools. The names of these children will be recorded on bronze plaques attached to the garden walls.

We are very grateful to Shirley and Greg Kerin from the New Town Station Nursery for their assistance with this project. Shirley and Greg are descendants of two children from the Orphan Schools and have been strong supporters of our Friends group for a number of years. For this project they have very generously donated the plants for the garden and will make a major contribution to the cost of the memorial plaques.

FOX'S FEAST

Sunday 26 February 2012

Celebrations this year will focus on our recently prepared Memorial Garden. We will have a short dedication ceremony during which a plaque honouring those children who died while at the Orphan Schools will be unveiled. This will be followed by afternoon tea in the Old Sunday School.

Sanatorium Huts

For some time members of our group have been very concerned about the long-term survival of the two chalets from the former Tasmanian Consumptive Sanatorium which now sit in the grounds of the St John's Precinct between Karingal and the former Parsonage. Late last year the Friends of the Orphan Schools Committee was given permission to organise some conservation work on the chalets.

A recent inspection by Heritage Tasmania's heritage advisor Danielle Picaud of the outside of the chalets has identified that urgent repairs are needed to conserve the chalets and prevent further deterioration. The main concern is to prevent any water damage. This would require work on the gutters, roof, fascia and barge-

boards. Poor drainage around the buildings is also a concern and would be improved with some trenches to direct the flow of water away from the chalets.

Since Danielle's inspection we have been able to look inside. It was good to see that no water damage has occurred so far.

Tasmanian Heritage Council Appointment

Congratulations to our Convenor Dr Dianne Snowden on her appointment as the new Chairperson of the Tasmanian Heritage Council. The Minister for the Environment, Parks and Heritage, Brian Wightman announced Dianne's appointment in December last year. Dianne together with the Director of National Parks and Wildlife will head a Council of thirteen members with expertise in various heritage, community and industry fields.

Dianne is a committed, passionate and experienced heritage professional and historian whose dedication and expertise make her an ideal and deserving candidate for this appointment. The Heritage Council has a vital but sometimes difficult role to play in its negotiations to ensure the protection and good management of Tasmania's important heritage place.

We are pleased that despite her new responsibilities Dianne will continue in her role as Convenor of the Friends of the Orphan Schools. We are also delighted that Chris Tassell, Managing Director of the National Trust in Tasmania has been appointed to the Council.

December Concert

Our Treasurer, Simon Cocker and fellow members of the Grass Roots Union Choir gave an outstanding performance of songs from *Loveless in Hobart Town* their musical based on the experience of Tolpuddle Martyr, George Loveless. The concert was held in St John's Church on Sunday 27 November. Two hundred dollars was raised, \$100 of which was passed on to the Church Organ Fund.

St John's Church News

Restoration of the church's William Hill organ will be undertaken in 2012. The organ has been in need of major repairs for some time. Funds set aside by the Parish Council together with the Organ Repair Fund and the successful application to the Tasmanian Community Fund for a grant of \$10,000 have allowed the work to progress. Repairs include the replacement of the blower, re-leathering and

refurbishment of the double-rise bellows.

Research News

From time to time one of us comes across interesting snippets of information about the Precinct in our searches of old newspapers. Dianne Snowden supplied the following interesting article that contributes to our understanding of the former St John's Burial Ground and suggests past uses for the Old Sunday School, which is surely the 'schoolroom' referred to in the article.

TREE PLANTING AT ST JOHN'S, NEW TOWN.

A parish commemoration of the Queen's Jubilee took place at St. John's Anglican Church, New Town, on Saturday afternoon, when 18 trees were publicly planted alongside the main carriage-way of the church yard, in the presence of a good number of people.

An evensong service was first held in the church, at which the temporary Administrator of the diocese (Archdeacon Whittington), assisted by the Rev. Mr. Cass, officiated, and Mrs. Malcolm Harrison presided at the organ.

A nice lot of young trees of various kinds were procured by Mr. Geo. Richardson, Superintendent of the Charitable Institution, for the ceremony from the Botanical Gardens.

Archdeacon WHITTINGTON, in an address delivered immediately before the planting of the first tree, spoke of the important duty of keeping clean and renovating the graveyard where their dead rested to await the trumpet of the resurrection. There was scarcely anything more distressing than to pass by a neglected graveyard, though often its upkeep was too great a strain upon the slender finances of the parish; but now at New Town, the boys of the institution had come to their assistance. Mr Richardson was anxious to provide spade and shovel and gardening work for some of the boys handy to the Home, and this particular roadway being the most convenient approach to the Home, he set them to work at improving it. All the brambles and bushes had been cleared away, and a very great improvement had been effected in the

churchyard generally. Then the tree planting to be done that afternoon was arranged for with Mr. Richardson's kind assistance. Possibly another row of trees would in time be supplied for the opposite side of the walk, and so make an avenue. He was very pleased and thankful that the wives of his two predecessors as Archdeacons of New Town were able to be present and to each plant a tree. The wives of several other clergymen would also take part in the ceremony.

Mrs. Davies, widow of the late Archdeacon Davies, then planted the first tree a Scotch pine, Mrs. Mason, widow of the late Archdeacon Mason (whom Archdeacon Whittington succeeded), planted the second, and Mrs. Whittington the third. The remainder of the trees were planted by ladies in the following order, Archdeacon Whittington himself planting the last: Mrs. Justice Dodds, Mesdames Hudspeth, Cass, Sutcliffe (wife of the churchwarden), Geo. Richardson, Watt, Jno. Pearce, Jas. Whyte, J. H. Innes, Malcolm Harrison, P. Wilkinson, St Hill, and P. S. Seager; Miss Murray, and the Archdeacon.

After the ceremony Mrs. Whittington served tea in the schoolroom, to which all present were invited, and in the evening a number of ladies and gentlemen entertained the boys at the institution.

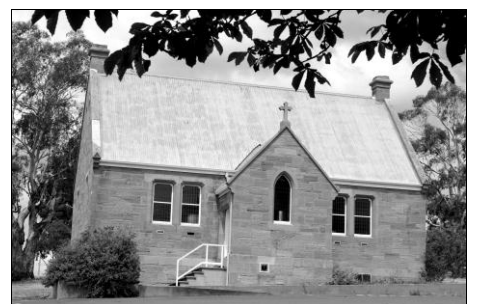
